

Editorial



My apologies ~ this has not been the easiest of editorials to write, and probably won't be the easiest to read due to the complexity and dryness of the subject. Please stick with it to the end and ask me to clarify anything of concern.

June is the last month of the church's financial year and the Property and Finance Committee will start work shortly on the budget for the next 12 months. This will be presented at our Annual Meeting in October. Meanwhile, following the retirement of the Rev. Margaret Garland, a group called the Ministry Settlement Board has been meeting in a Covid-interrupted way and working through the slow process of discerning our ministry needs. A significant part of this is considering our financial viability. That is an area of concern!

It is timely to highlight a few things.

1. Where do we get our income from? Answer: from all of us. Parishes receive no external funding from the national church body. We are totally reliant on the giving of us all, the Opoho

parishioners, boosted by a tiny bit from garage and hall rental, a diminishing amount from interest on investment after the sale of the manse, and fund-raising (a big contributor for the last three years – thank you all!). Giving by parishioners during the Covid-19 lockdown did, as expected, drop 10% due to the loss of Sunday offerings in the plate, but we will still be close to our target (budget was \$72,000) for this financial year.

- 2. On the expenses side, apart from paying levies to the national church (PCANZ) through the Assembly levy and the Southern Presbytery to the tune of \$6,000 each year, our main expenses are the paid ministry of around \$82,000 per annum, rates/insurance/power of \$10,500 pa, and then the impact of various maintenance projects. Our expenses average \$100,000 per annum without additional major maintenance projects, and of course each year they rise.
- Our largest outgoing is paid ministry and we have to fund it ourselves – entirely!
- 4. Ten years ago our offerings were falling, and parishioner offerings of \$52,000 was a good year but this at least covered the cost of a full-time minister back then. In an editorial five

years ago, I posed the challenge of us either lifting our offerings or accepting the prospect of a carefully managed closure of the Opoho Church. Things have improved but, without using reserves, we are still \$12,000 short of a breakeven budget, and this does not allow for larger maintenance projects such as the much-needed rewiring the church.

Many questions emerge from the above snapshot of the finances.

Firstly, is it reasonable now to raise the historical notion of giving of 10% to church/charitable causes? See Deuteronomy 14.23 re this concept of tithing. Wow – how was that ever possible even just a few decades ago?! Or would it be reasonable to promote giving per income earner or family of perhaps 5% of pre-tax income, or more realistically, 6.5% of after-tax income shared not only to church but also other important organisations such as Enliven, Night Shelter etc.? The good news is all these donations are tax-deductible with a third being refunded. I am fairly sure if that level of giving was possible across most of the congregation, we would have a financially secure ministry.

The alternative is to look at our expenses. Although paid ministry is the major one, the cost of human time and money in maintaining the large buildings is also significant, especially when we consider deferred maintenance and the clear need for rewiring and improved heating in the church. Who are the buildings for?

In Matthew 25:14-30 Jesus tells the parable of the three servants, and amongst other points, suggests that it is not enough to sit on our gifts, including money, and not use them. This point surely raises many important questions, including what is the best use of the offerings of God's people of Opoho. Indeed one could ask, does God's mission in Opoho require this set of buildings? Does the Opoho Church have a missional responsibility for maintaining an appealing well-maintained set of buildings that can be used by the community and if so, are the building and grounds fit for purpose and is the cost in maintaining them justified? Are our buildings a wonderful legacy, or a millstone absorbing much of our energy and money?

Maintaining full-time ministry with such a tenuous financial base has been challenging but has been the ongoing desire of our congregation. To put it bluntly, to maintain full-time ministry our income from offerings needs to increase by 16% per annum (\$12,000). In order for this to happen each of us will need to review our committed giving and, where appropriate, consider quite a big uplift. This ideally needs to happen with the new financial year, i.e. now!

These financial issues are part of what the Ministry Settlement Board (and later on the congregation) will have to consider, along with the many questions of what style of ministry we will seek. Wouldn't it would be a wonderful thing if giving can rise to meet our expenses and we can say, "Yes, we can definitely afford a minister, full-time, thank you!"

I would love to discuss these issues with anyone, field questions and suggestions, and have feedback about the above. Please talk to me.

Property and Finance Update

This month's editorial reminds us that we are entirely self-funding in our operation on the hill and, although the vacancy allows us some breathing space, the discernment of the Ministry Settlement Board in looking at a call for a new minister will include a critical consideration of our finances. Historically, parishes worked from a base of pledges made at the start of the financial year, giving a clear indication of what the income might be, and families would commit up to 10% of income to the church or other charitable causes. It is perhaps hard to believe in these days of families needing two incomes just to cover mortgage or rental payments.

Our financial year finished at the end of June and a new budget will be presented at the Annual Meeting in October. Offerings dropped 10%, as expected during Covid-19 lockdown, due to the loss of the Sunday plate and this is a good reminder that setting a regular payment via internet banking avoids that problem.

Meanwhile we can announce that we will soon have a change of Treasurer. Brian Cunningham who has carried the role for the past 20 years will be taking a well overdue break and we welcome Judy Rodda as the new Treasurer. Brian has made a massive contribution in his various roles on Property and Finance and Parish Council over the last 30+ years and, in particular, the role of Treasurer has been a very critical and responsible one. We might just notice his broad grin when he hands over the reins. Well done and thank you Brian, have a week or two off, and then ...?

On Sunday 14 June the church reached the not-so-balmy level of 12.5° C by the end of the service. This is not good enough and we are seeking quotes for rewiring and heating solutions. The heating arrangements in the hall are wonderful compared to the past when all heaters had to be left on overnight with curtains drawn to enable us to run winter holiday programmes. We hope we can achieve the same in the church.

Invitation to join our database


