### Winter Wednesday Worship Series

The first of the winter Wednesday Worship (WW) series was based on the book by Ernest Loosely: When the Church was Young, written in the 1930s. He explores the differences in being church then and now, and concludes that there is much to be learnt from the early church. Discussion centred round the absence, then, of buildings, denominations, dogma, in-house language, bible, and the presence then of first hand experience of Jesus, of core teachings, and a sense of awe at the very presence of God with us. While the answer was not to go back to what used to be, the questioning of what we have become through the lens of the early church offers some real insight into the way we could renew and re-energise the church

Grace was the focus of the WW service led by John Stenhouse. He asked the congregation to reflect on and respond to a series of questions. What did 'grace' mean to you? How did you experience God's grace? What was it like to be in the presence of a gracious person? How could we be gracious to others? We then watched a short YouTube presentation by John Barclay, Lightfoot Professor of Divinity at the University of Durham, summarising his recent book Paul and the Gift. Barclay explained what the Apostle Paul meant when he described Christ as God's gracious gift to the world. Ancient religions often described God as an abundant giver of good gifts to humanity. What made Christianity distinctive, Barclay explained, was Paul's insistence on the incongruity of God's grace. In Christ, God extended love, grace, compassion and forgiveness not to the deserving and the worthy but to the undeserving and the unworthy. As Paul put it: 'While we were yet sinners Christ died for us.' Members of the congregation reflected on Barclay's insights. Our songs included 'Amazing Grace.'

Ephesians 4:31-32: Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

Meegan, and Mary Somerville, took one of the WW services, and focused on "Forgiveness". They presented different aspects of forgiveness as it reflected in our lives. Sometimes it reflects in very difficult ways for those who have been through abuse or other difficult situations, but we were able to see how Jesus taught us to focus on forgiveness as a healing process and a kind of journey we all take at times in our lives, whether that be individually or in a corporate/church setting.

The final WW service focused on wintering: a proactive approach to making the most of winter times. Just as there are seasons in nature, there are seasons in our spiritual life: the hope and new beginnings of the spring, the growth and joy of summer, the harvest and transitions of the autumn ~ and we cannot escape winters of the soul any more than we can escape winters of the weather. As Shirley Murray wrote in the hymn, *Our Life Has Its Seasons*:

"Our life has its seasons, and God has the reasons, why spring follows winter, and new leaves grow..."

We concluded the final service, and the series, with our usual custom of sharing Holy Communion ~ this time serving each other hot mulled apple juice and freshly made bread.
